Course Reviewer Comments **Rachel Schwien (rschwien) (10/12/18 3:20 pm):** Additional Rationale - The impact will be that this will facilitate students' graduating in a timely fashion. The American Psychological Association (APA) accreditation standards mandate that we provide educational experiences in cognitive, affective, and social bases of behaviors. Previously each of these were taught in a single standalone course. Combining these into one course satisfies APA standards and reduces the course burden for students (who still will have a high course burden). It also assures course availability in these areas. We have lost faculty who taught cognitive and affective psychology. Additionally, social psychology has historically been problematic for our students to take because faculty members who teach these courses prefer very small seminars that can be difficult to get into.
