Catalog Description This course will examine the definitions and characteristics of human trafficking, both domestically and internationally. The course will compare a range of national and international policies addressing human trafficking, paying particular attention to the frameworks and ideologies shaping those initiatives. Ending human trafficking is a non-partisan issue, often bringing together policy makers and activist that would otherwise never work in coalition. Yet, the current movement to end trafficking also has deep chasms and ideological divisions. There are surprising, uncharacteristic divisions among groups that would otherwise be in unity. This class will examine the contemporary social movements to end trafficking and will attempt to understand the contentious politics found within the movement. How trafficking is framed can have a significant impact on the implementation of anti-trafficking legislation. The course will also examine the significant empirical challenges for studying human trafficking. While estimates of human trafficking vary widely, there is limited verifiable evidence of the extent of trafficking in any one area. This course is offered at the 500 and 700 level with additional assignments at the 700 level. Not open to students with credit in WGSS 514, POLS 514, or GIST 514.
