## History Program

The history major allows students to explore the richness and diversity of human experience in the past while building skills of analysis, interpretation, research and communication. All history majors gain knowledge of significant historical transformations that have shaped the world. History majors learn to think critically to conduct historical research, and to present the results of their research in clear and coherent writing.

### First- and Second-Year Preparation

Prospective majors are encouraged to enroll in 1 or 2 introductory courses at the 100 or 300 level in the first 2 years. Many introductory history courses fulfill College's HT or NW principal course requirements, and prospective majors might choose one of them to explore their interests in history. Students who come to KU with AP or transfer credit should be aware that only 9 hours of history course work numbered 100-299 may be counted toward the major. Students interested in history as a major are encouraged to meet with a department advisor early in their careers at KU to discuss their academic goals and interests. Contact the undergraduate secretary to schedule an advising appointment.
